The Metro West Fire Protection District provides fire, EMS and rescue services to 57 square miles of west St. Louis County. This includes all or portions of Ballwin. Castlewood, Chesterfield, Clarkson Valley, Ellisville, Sherman, Wildwood, Winchester, and unincorporated St. Louis County. Nearly 100 firefighter/paramedics run over 9,000 calls for service a year out of five fire stations. Metro West provides a host of specialized rescue services and maintains one of the only dive rescue teams in the region.





## **Station 3 Reimagined**

In 2024, Metro West marked the completion of a major renovation of Station 3, the oldest facility in the district. Built in 1983, Station 3 serves a critical role as an operational fire station, maintenance facility, administrative office and home to the fire prevention bureau. It is one of two stations dedicated to protecting the Wildwood community, covering 12.7 square miles and serving more than 16,900 residents.



The renovation project was made possible by the passage of Proposition S in April, 2022. This \$25 million bond issue provided funding for critical lifesaving equipment and facility improvements across the district over a ten-year period. Station 3's renovation became one of the first major projects under this initiative.

Key improvements to Station 3 include:

- The addition of individual bedrooms and restrooms, offering enhanced comfort and privacy for fire crews during 48-hour shifts.
- New cancer prevention measures, including upgraded turnout gear storage to reduce exposure to harmful contaminants.
- Redesigned office space to increase efficiency for administrative staff.
- Updates to critical building systems such as HVAC, fire suppression, water and sewer, ensuring the facility meets modern safety and operational standards.

The upgrades of Station 3 represent a significant investment in the future of emergency services, enhancing service to the Wildwood community.

Metro West experienced a landmark year marked by operational excellence, major incident responses and a continued focus on professional development.





Special operations teams managed high-risk water rescues, hazardous materials incidents and Urban Search and Rescue (USAR) missions with outstanding skill and adaptability. The district enhanced its operational capabilities by placing a new fire truck into service and launching a strategic apparatus management initiative to support long-term fleet readiness. Training remained a top priority, with significant investments in innovative programs to strengthen member proficiency across all disciplines.



#### WILDWOOD HOTEL

On February 14, 2024, a fire at the Wildwood Hotel was contained to a single room with minimal structural damage thanks to sprinkler activation and the quick work of responding fire crews, saving millions of dollars in property.





## **EMS Operations**

The Metro West emergency medical services (EMS) division demonstrated exceptional dedication and growth, responding to over 7,000 EMS calls while focusing on furthering Advanced Life Support (ALS) capabilities. Firefighter/paramedics benefited from rigorous, scenario-based training developed by EMS training officers and the medical direction of Mercy St. Louis, ensuring continuous improvement and outstanding performance.



Equipped with state-of-the-art life-saving tools and a commitment to excellence, firefighter/paramedics achieved remarkable patient outcomes, reinforcing the mission to deliver the highest standard of emergency medical care to the community.

## **Advanced Tools of the Trade**

Metro West remains committed to investing in the best tools available to protect the health and safety of residents. These upgrades were made possible due to the community's continued support through Proposition V (2017) and Proposition S (2022).

#### **Cardiac Emergencies**

The Philips Tempus Pro Advanced Life Support monitor/defibrillator provides advanced cardiac monitoring, real-time vital signs, and rapid defibrillation which allows for more informed decisions during cardiac emergencies, ensuring efficient, high-quality care in the field.



## **Airway Management**

The addition of McGrath video laryngoscopes improves airway management by providing clear, real-time view of the vocal cords, increasing success rates and offering a more effective delivery of care.

### **Respiratory Support**

ZOLL mechanical ventilators provide advanced respiratory care in critical situations by delivering precise, consistent breaths to patients in respiratory failure, cardiac arrest or severe trauma.



## **CPR Compressions**

The LUCAS device delivers consistent, mechanical chest compressions during cardiac arrest, ensuring uninterrupted, high-quality CPR and improving patient outcomes.

## **Dive Rescue Team**

The Metro West Dive Team is a specialized unit uniquely equipped to conduct underwater rescue and recovery operations in rivers, ponds and lakes. The team is composed of highly trained professionals who respond not only within the district but across the St. Louis Region.

Due to their advanced capabilities, the team was called upon for both rescue and recovery missions in 2024. In addition, the team supported evidence recovery operations for major crime investigations, working alongside local and federal law enforcement agencies.

The bureau also works closely with city building officials



to promote safer construction and building practices. Through a focus on education, enforcement and prevention, the bureau of fire prevention works to protect lives and property across the community.




#### **Public Education**

## The Phoenix Award

The Metro West Phoenix Award is presented to a firefighter/paramedic who has assisted in three clinical saves—incidents where a patient in cardiac arrest achieves return of spontaneous circulation (ROSC). ROSC marks the critical moment when the heart begins beating effectively on its own after stopping, often as a result of timely CPR and skilled emergency care. This award honors the life-saving impact of first responders and their role in giving patients a second chance at life.

# Commission on Fire Accreditation International


Metro West submitted a comprehensive annual compliance report to the Commission on Fire Accreditation International (CFAI). The report, required to maintain active accredited status, was accepted by the commission for accreditation at the Center for Public Safety Excellence.

CFAI accreditation is an all-hazard, quality improvement model based on risk analysis and self-assessment. It promotes the establishment of community-adopted performance targets for fire and emergency service agencies.

Metro West is one of only seven fire organizations in the State of Missouri and one of only 284 in the world to receive accreditation from CFAI.



Only 11% of the US population is protected by an accredited fire agency.



## **PulsePoint**

PulsePoint continues to play a vital role in strengthening Metro West's chain of survival by empowering CPR-trained citizens to act during sudden cardiac emergencies. This innovative app alerts nearby responders simultaneously with fire/EMS, helping reduce the critical time between collapse and the start of life-saving interventions like

CPR and defibrillation. By notifying trained bystanders already in the area, PulsePoint enhances the potential for positive outcomes when seconds count. The free PulsePoint app can be downloaded via the QR code shown.
